## Ponderings from Your Pastor

A voice told him, "Get up, Peter! Kill and eat!" Peter exclaimed, "Absolutely not, Lord! I have never eaten anything impure or unclean." The voice spoke a second time, "Never consider unclean what God has made pure." (Acts 10:13-15, The Common English Bible)

The vision of Peter on his way to see Cornelius is one of the most compelling arguments for the inclusion of believers who do not fit the mold of what good upstanding church people ought to be. So on the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our decision to be Open and Affirming, I thought it would be appropriate to include it in my monthly article. While our congregation was ahead of the curve on fully including LGBTQ folk, we still have work to do and still have attitudes that get in the way of fully including those whom God loves.

The rest of my space in this month's edition of *The Call* is devoted to an excerpt from *Bits of History at Urbandale United Church of Christ*. (pp 62-63) "Urbandale UCC's Open and Affirming (ONA) process unofficially began sometime in 1989, when a man with AIDS asked Rev. de Jong if she would help him die. Many in the congregation got to know this man through praying and caring for him. He put a human face on the AIDS issue.

"The Long-Range Planning Committee described as one of its recommended goals in its Report issued in Early 1990: "We recommend that this church engage in a process of education and dialogue to become an Open and Affirming Congregation." In the several months following the congregational vote accepting the Committee's Report, adult education sessions were held on issues including the spectrum of human sexuality, gay/lesbian experience in the church, and AIDS. The Community Concerns Board supported and helped co-sponsor various programs and conferences in the community relating to gay and lesbian issues.

"In the Spring of 1991, ONA activities slowed as several people in the church already thought the church was an open and affirming church. By this time, a few gay and lesbian people had joined or were worshipping at our church regularly.

"In January 1993, several adult educational sessions were planned by the task force and sponsored by the Church Council, including speakers such as Rev. Chuck Briem, Associate Conference Minister; Rev. Don Gall, Conference Minister; Sylvia Thorsen-Smith, a member of the Presbyterian's committee on human sexuality; and Rev. Rosemary Iha and two lay persons from Faith UCC in Iowa City, the first UCC church in Iowa to formally become ONA.

"Following the adult education sessions, the Community Concerns Board recommended to the Council, and the Council voted, to present an ONA resolution to the congregation. The resolution modified the language in the church's existing Mission Statement. The pertinent paragraph as modified read:

'We covenant to be a community that remains open to the challenges of the Christian faith. We welcome into this community of faith and affirm the participation in all aspects of church life, persons of every age, race, gender, nationality, ability, and sexual orientation. We will continue our efforts toward inclusiveness and stand against all forms of discrimination. We will empower ourselves, our children, and one another to be fully present in the world, living in Christ's image, and striving for justice and peace.

"On May 16, 1993, the congregation voted to become an ONA church by a vote of 101 yes, 2 no, and 2 abstentions. After the vote, the congregation gathered in a circle around the altar and sang 'Amazing Grace.' Urbandale UCC was the 103<sup>rd</sup> church to become ONA in our denomination."

I hope you will plan to join us in celebrating this important milestone in our history. The following special events are in the works:

May 6, Pulpit Exchange with Ames UCC. The Rev. Eileen Gebbie preaching

May 13, Anniversary Service. Andy Lang, Executive Director of the Open and Affirming Coalition of the United Church of Christ preaching.

May 20, Wrap-up with greetings from area LGBTQ agencies.

May we all continue the work of overcoming the things that divide us! Amen!

#### **URBANDALE UCC VISION STATEMENT**

**Social Justice** – Spiritual depth propels us into the world to live out justice and create God's Realm on earth.

**Worship** – the worship experience is engaging, meaningful, creative, innovative and active.

Days for Girls mission and vision: We're turning periods into pathways. Days for Girls increases access to menstrual care and education by developing global partnerships, cultivating social enterprises, mobilizing volunteers, and innovating sustainable solutions that shatter stigmas and limitations for women and girls. Together, we're creating a world with dignity, health, and opportunity for all. Our movement has reached more than one million girls — and counting (in 116+ countries)! With your help, we can reach Every Girl. Everywhere. Period.

We especially love that we can choose the recipient of the Days for Girls menstrual care bags. We are sending them to **ASAH** (**African Soul, American Heart**) girls currently attending school in Uganda. We have learned that menstrual cycles can disrupt girls' learning by keeping them from attending school. The care kits will allow girls to attend school and live life with dignity and respect.

ASAH's mission is to **Protect, Educate, and Empower** orphaned girls from the Republic of South Sudan through primary school, secondary school, and beyond. ASAH **Protects** our students from forced and early marriage, from disease through vaccinations and medical care, and now, from the civil war. ASAH **Educates** our students in school subjects and practical life skills to prepare them to support themselves and their families in the future. ASAH **Empowers** our students to be leaders and to give back to their communities that they may help their troubled nation establish and maintain peace for all.

The gifts God gave were...for building up the body of Christ (Ephesians 4:11-12)



The Bible tells us that the church is the *body* of Christ. And yet we say that the body of Christ is also the body that was killed on a cross and that rose, as a body, from the grave. The Gospels seem to go out of their way to emphasize that the risen Jesus is not a ghost but a real body with the wounds of the earlier day. As we heard last month, Jesus even ate fish because he was hungry as a real person feels

stomach pangs (Luke 24:41-42). And then whenever we have Communion, we are told as we watch a real, molecular piece of bread, "This is my body." So what is this body that is talked about in so many different ways?

What the Bible is telling us is that matter matters. The body matters. The bread matters. The church matters. What is holy and precious and valuable and loved by God is our very flesh and bones. Matter matters. Whatever we think we are doing as a church with our worship services and potlucks and Vacation Bible School and providing a week's hospitality to people experiencing homelessness, it can never be separated from the physical reality of our bodies being somewhere, engaging in some action, reaching out and touching someone. God is telling us, what is physical is important.

So when we talk about the Strengthen the Church, and give money to "strengthen the church" we are providing real support to real people doing real things. The Strengthen the Church offering supports the expansion of ministry and growth of UCC local congregations. We will collect that offering on Pentecost (May 20<sup>th</sup>), as a birthday present on the birthday of the church. Your gifts last year helped start or sustain 24 new communities of faith. Your support of this offering will help the UCC fulfill on its commitment to creating a just world for all by investing in new ministries and practices that meet the emerging needs of local communities.

The Body of Christ, as the church, is then the real presence of Christ where that presence has not been discernable before. Therefore, the gifts you give are for building up the body of Christ. And that body is crucified today as it was long ago. And that body is raised up as it was long ago. And that body feels hunger as it did long ago. And that body needs your support, as Jesus relied on the support of His friends to give him a piece of fish and continue his ministry and presence is the days and years that followed. We still do that today. Support the Body of Christ with your gift to Strengthen the Church.
