PRELUDE

INTRODUCTORY REMARKS

- If you can have multiple tabs or windows open on your device, you can pull up the bulletin for this service by going to urbucc.org,
- Today, we will be remembering and honoring some of the losses we have experienced in the past year, so if you want to include a reminder of what you have lost take a moment now to set that up in your space, in addition to whatever helps you pray, meditate, or be mindful of God's presence. We will be ringing a bell to remember those from our congregation who have died, so if you want to find something to ring, you can do that. It may be that whatever device you are using can make a sound like a bell, or you can just ring your own doorbell when the time comes.
- We will be taking communion during our service, so if you haven't already, grab a piece of bread for each person watching, and something fruity to drink. Wine or grape juice are most often used but if all you have is Dr. Pepper, that'll do.
- We will be asking you to jot some things down, which you may be able to do on the device you are using to watch this, or you can grab a pad and pen or pencil.
- Later in the service we will read from the **Gospel of Matthew**, **Chapter 23**, so if you have a Bible handy you might want to get it and turn to that passage. We will be reading from the Inclusive Bible, so you can compare it with your translation.

SCRIPTURE

Matthew 23:1-12 (The Inclusive Bible)

¹Jesus told the crowds and the disciples, ²"The religious scholars and the Pharisees have succeeded Moses as teachers; ³therefore, perform every observance they tell you to. But don't follow their example; even they don't do what they say. ⁴They tie up heavy loads and lay them on others' shoulders, while they themselves will not lift a finger to alleviate the burden.

⁵"All their works are performed to be seen. They widen their phylacteries and wear huge tassels. ⁶They are fond of places of honor at banquets and the front seats in synagogues. ⁷They love respectful greetings in public and being called 'Rabbi.'

⁸"But as for you, avoid the title 'Rabbi.' For you have only one Teacher, and you are all sisters and brothers. ⁹And don't call anyone on earth your 'Mother' or 'Father.' You have only one Parent – our loving God in heaven. ¹⁰Avoid being called leaders. You have only one leader – the Messiah.

¹¹"The greatest among you will be the one who serves the rest. ¹²Those who exalt themselves will be humbled, but those who humble themselves will be exalted."

The titles used in verses 8-10 were familiar to the people to whom Matthew wrote. Rabbis were authorities on religious law, and while the word is often translated "teacher," a different Greek word is paired with it in verse 8, the same word used in verse 10, kathegetes, which is better translated as guide or instructor, implying a skill or method is being taught as opposed to concepts or theory. This fits with Jesus' penchant for emphasizing practicality in applying the law, underscores his point in verse 4, where the religious scholars and Pharisees make following the law burdensome.
